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I. SUMMARY

The Trauma Informed Sexual Assault Investigations Grant's purpose is to enhance the ability of Florida law enforcement agencies to conduct trauma informed sexual assault investigations. **The grant will fund two agencies at up to \$200,000 disbursed at up to \$100,000 for two state fiscal years to:**

- Hire at least one additional detective who will focus exclusively on investigating sex crimes against victims 11 years and older.
- Participate in a one-day site visit with Florida Council Against Sexual Violence (FCASV) staff and law enforcement consultants to review the agency's current response to sexual assault. FCASV will meet with representatives from patrol, investigations, leadership/command, the state attorney's office, the forensic exam facility or hospital, and the certified sexual assault program. FCASV will develop a process map identifying current practices and opportunities for improvement.
- Hold a two-day training on trauma informed sexual assault investigations, attended by any detectives who respond to sex crimes and their direct supervisors (training is also open to advocates, nurses, prosecutors, patrol, and other responders the agency wishes to invite).
- Regularly collaborate with the certified sexual assault program to advance the trauma informed response.
- Review and update sex crimes policies and procedures with trauma informed practices.
- Assign two detectives (or other personnel to be determined in consultation with FCASV) to attend an FCASV two-day trauma informed investigations train-the-trainer event if offered during the subgrant period.

Importance of Trauma Informed Investigations

In the first half of 2017, FDLE'S Uniform Crime Reports show Florida crime rates dropped 2%, but rape reports increased by 8%. Sexual assault is a crime that affects people from all backgrounds. One in six Florida women have been raped in their lifetimes, and one in 10 rape reports involves a male victim.^{1 2}

Successful prosecution of offenders depends on quality investigations and survivors with the necessary support to proceed through the system. Trauma informed investigations lead to better evidence collection and corroboration, resulting in increased arrests and more successful criminal prosecutions. A 2014 study of West Valley City Police Department in Salt Lake County, Utah found that within one year of training all detectives in trauma informed investigations, sexual assault prosecutions went from 5.5% to 24%. Florida jurisdictions applying the trauma informed approach also report higher confidence and trust in law enforcement and the criminal justice system.

II. OVERVIEW

Introduction

Sexual violence shatters lives, wounds communities and perpetuates injustice. The Florida Council Against Sexual Violence leads, informs and inspires the people of Florida to create safe and just communities.

FCASV provides information, assistance, and leadership on all aspects of sexual violence (including rape, child sexual abuse, stalking and sexual harassment, and sex trafficking) and trauma-informed care. FCASV certifies and funds sexual assault programs that provide quality services and maintain compliance with certification standards. Another primary component of FCASV's work is collaborating with law enforcement agencies and state attorneys' offices to improve the criminal justice response to sexual assault survivors and increase offender accountability.

About the Project

FCASV is soliciting proposals for the STOP (Services-Training-Officers-Prosecutors) Violence Against Women ACT (VAWA) Grant Program (CFDA 16.588) funded by the Department of Justice, Office on Violence Against Women (OVW) to the Florida Department of Children and Families and passed through the Florida Department of Health (DOH) to FCASV for distribution to subrecipients. Despite its name, VAWA is a gender neutral program that applies to victims of all genders. The purpose is to promote a coordinated, multi-disciplinary approach to enhancing advocacy and improving the criminal justice system's response to violent crimes. VAWA encourages the development and improvement of effective law enforcement and prosecution strategies and the development and improvement of advocacy and services. The Trauma Informed Sexual Assault Investigations Grant, described in this RFP, offers law enforcement agencies funds to hire and train an investigator/detective to conduct trauma informed sexual assault investigations for victims 11 and older.

III. ELIGIBILITY

Eligible applicants are limited to Florida law enforcement agencies.

IV. STATEMENT OF INTENT TO APPLY (REQUIRED)

Applicants are **required** to provide a **Statement of Intent to apply** to FCASV by June 5, 2018. The statement must be submitted by email to Marie Dowling at mdowling@fcasv.org. In the subject line please indicate, "Trauma Informed Sexual Assault Investigations, Intent to Apply." The body of the message must include the following:

- Name of the applicant law enforcement agency
- Name of the applicant law enforcement jurisdiction
- Contact name, title, email and telephone number (related to this RFP)

Submitting a Statement of Intent to Apply does not obligate the agency to apply. It will, however, help FCASV anticipate resources required to complete the application reviews.

V. APPLICATION DEADLINE

Applications for the Trauma Informed Sexual Assault Investigations Grant must be received on or before **June 22, 2018, at 5:00 PM, EDT**. No proposals will be accepted beyond that time. It is expected that official notice of the selected sites will be posted on the FCASV website (www.fcasv.org) by July 2, 2018.

Applications must be submitted electronically to Marie Dowling at mdowling@fcasv.org. **As the single point of contact, all communications related to this RFP must be submitted electronically to Ms. Dowling.** To avoid any potential application submission problems, FCASV strongly urges applicants to submit applications 72 hours prior to the application due date. Late applications will be disqualified and will not be reviewed.

VI. RFP QUESTIONS AND CLARIFICATION

VII. AWARD PERIOD AND FUNDS AVAILABLE

The grant award period is effective July 1, 2018 through June 30, 2020. **The grant will fund two agencies at up to \$200,000 disbursed at up to \$100,000 for two state fiscal years.** Awards are contingent on the availability of funds.

VIII. TRAUMA INFORMED SEXUAL ASSAULT INVESTIGATIONS GRANT FOCUS

The grant's purpose is to enhance law enforcement agencies' ability to conduct trauma informed sexual assault investigations. The grant will fund two agencies to:

- Hire at least one additional detective who will focus exclusively on investigating sex crimes against victims 11 years and older.
- Participate in a one-day site visit with FCASV staff and law enforcement consultants to review the agency's current response to sexual assault. FCASV will meet with representatives from patrol, investigations, leadership/command, the state attorney's office, the forensic exam facility or hospital, and the certified sexual assault program. FCASV will develop a process map identifying current practices and opportunities for improvement.
- Hold a two-day training on trauma informed sexual assault investigations, attended by any detectives who respond to sex crimes and their direct supervisors (training is also open to advocates, nurses, prosecutors, patrol, and other responders the agency wishes to invite).
- Regularly collaborate with the certified sexual assault program to advance the trauma informed response.
- Review and update sex crimes policies and procedures with trauma informed practices.
- Assign two detectives (or other personnel to be determined in consultation with FCASV) to

attend an FCASV two-day trauma informed investigations train-the-trainer event if offered during the grant period.

Florida is a national leader in advancing trauma informed response and investigative techniques. FCASV developed the trauma informed training with subject matter experts from across Florida and the nation to create an intensive curriculum incorporating the most up-to-date sexual assault investigative strategies. Using new research on the neurobiological effects of trauma, the training teaches the Forensic Experiential Trauma Interview, or FETI, technique, redefining the way law enforcement interviews and gathers information from victims.

Training topics include:

- Trauma informed dispatch
- Neurobiology of trauma and how reactions to trauma affect victim behavior during and after an assault
- Trauma's effect on memory encoding and retrieval
- Trauma sensitive verbal and non-verbal communication, resulting in better victim cooperation and less retraumatization
- Use of the Forensic Experiential Trauma Interview (FETI), a new interview technique now used by the military to elicit more details from victims about the assault
- Cutting-edge sexual assault investigative techniques
- Advanced instruction on how to document the victim's disclosure, corroborate evidence, and improve investigative reports

IX. REPORTING REQUIREMENTS

All successful applicants must submit the following reports in accordance with subgrant requirements. Failure to do so may result in withheld payments, financial penalties or funding to be rescinded.

Trauma Informed Sexual Assault Investigations Progress Report to document achievement of service tasks. Sites must complete quarterly reports on the number of sex crimes reports received (against victims 11 years and older) and the disposition of the case, including arrests and cases forwarded to the state attorney’s office.

Expenditure Reports to document that grant funds were spent in accordance with the pre-approved line item budget. Each report shall identify award and match expenditures for the period indicated.

Annual Financial Report to identify total award and match expenditures. Any remaining funds must be remitted to FCASV with this report.

Federal Annual Progress Report to document services on a semiannual basis.

X. FINANCIAL CONSIDERATIONS

Funding Restrictions

Federal assistance awards are governed by the provisions of OMB Uniform Guidance, 2 CFR Part 200 (https://www.ecfr.gov/cgi-bin/text-idx?tpl=/ecfrbrowse/Title02/2cfr200_main_02.tpl). Additionally, OVW awards are covered by the DOJ Financial Guide. The DOJ Financial Guide (https://ojp.gov/financialguide/doj/pdfs/DOJ_FinancialGuide.pdf) includes information on allowable costs, methods of payment, audit requirements, accounting systems, and financial records. This document also outlines the successful administration of grant funds.

Cash or In-Kind Match

Matching contributions of 25% (cash or in-kind) **of the total cost of the project** (VAWA grant amount plus local match) are required. See the chart below to calculate required match amount.

- Documenting additional match beyond the amount required, such as in-kind salary and benefit amounts for training attendees, helps in Florida’s efforts to receive continued VAWA funds. *Match must be derived from non-federal sources.*
- Sources of match are restricted to the same requirements as funds allocated under the STOP Formula Grant Program and must be documented in the same manner as STOP

Formula Grant Program funds, including financial and programmatic reports.

- The budget must include the required match as a percentage of the total project budget. Specifics of the match (amount and source) must be clearly identified in both the Budget Detail and Budget Narrative.
- In-kind match must be supported by documentation to show fair market value and be available upon request.
 - Funds or in-kind resources used as match must be directly related to the project goals and objectives.
 - Records must be maintained which clearly show the source, the amount, and the timing of all matching contributions.

- Office space and utilities for the project
- Supervision and project consultation
- Additional officer time related to project
- Office supplies

Supplanting

STOP VAWA funds must be used to supplement existing state and local funds for program activities and must not replace those funds that have been appropriated for the same purpose.

Factors Affecting Allowability of Costs (OMB Uniform Guidance, 2 CFR 200.403)

Except where otherwise authorized by statute, costs must meet the following general criteria in order to be allowable under federal awards:

- Be necessary and reasonable for the performance of the federal award and be allocable under OMB Uniform Guidance.
- Conform to any limitations or exclusions set forth under OMB Uniform Guidance or in the federal award as to types or amount of cost items.
- Be consistent with policies and procedures that apply uniformly to both federally-financed and other activities of the non-federal entity.

- Be accorded consistent treatment. A cost may not be assigned to a federal award as a direct cost if any other cost incurred for the same purpose in like circumstances has been allocated to the federal award as an indirect cost.
- Be determined in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP), except, for state and local governments and Indian tribes only, as otherwise provided for in this part.
- Not be included as a cost or used to meet cost sharing or matching requirements of any other federally-financed program in either the current or a prior period. See also OMB Uniform Guidance, 2 CFR 200.306 Cost sharing or matching paragraph (b).
- Be adequately documented. See also OMB Uniform Guidance, 2 CFR 200.300, Statutory and National Policy Requirements through 2 CFR 200.309, Period of Performance of this part.

Indirect Cost Rate Agreement (if applicable)

As described in 2 CFR 200.403 Factors Affecting Allowability of Costs, costs must be consistently charged as either indirect or direct costs, but may not be double charged or inconsistently charged as both. If chosen, this methodology once elected must be used consistently for all federal awards until such time as a non-federal entity chooses to negotiate for a rate, which the non-federal entity may apply to do at any time. This includes state and local governments that have never negotiated an indirect cost rate with the federal government and receive less than \$35 million in direct federal funding per year.

Applicants that intend to charge indirect costs through the use of an indirect cost rate must have a federally-approved indirect cost rate agreement. *Please include a copy of a current, signed federally-approved indirect cost rate agreement with the application.* If the applicant agency has never received a federally-approved indirect cost rate, it may elect to charge a de minimis rate of 10% of *modified* total direct costs (MTDC) which may be used indefinitely, in accordance with 2 CFR Section 200.68. (MTDC means all direct salaries and wages, applicable fringe benefits, materials and supplies, services, travel, and up to the first \$25,000 of each subaward (regardless of the period of performance of the subawards under the award). MTDC excludes equipment, capital expenditures, charges for patient care, rental costs, tuition remission, scholarships and fellowships, participant support costs and the portion of each subaward in excess of \$25,000. Other items may only be excluded when necessary to avoid a serious inequity in the distribution of indirect costs, and with the approval of the cognizant agency for indirect costs.)

XI. OVW GUIDELINES

Unallowable Activities

OVW has determined the activities listed below to be unallowable, and they will not be supported by STOP Formula Grant Program funding. Applications that propose unallowable activities may receive point deductions during the review process. Applications that include substantial unallowable activities will not be considered for funding.

- Lobbying, except with explicit statutory authorization
- Fundraising

- Purchase of real property
- Physical modifications to buildings, including minor renovations (such as painting or carpeting)
- Construction

Violence Against Women Act Non-Discrimination Provision

The Violence Against Women Reauthorization Act of 2013 added a new civil rights provision that applies to all FY 2017 OVW grants. This provision prohibits OVW grantees from excluding, denying benefits to, or discriminating against any person on the basis of actual or perceived race, color, religion, national origin, sex, gender identity, sexual orientation, or disability in any program or activity funded in whole or in part by OVW.

Accessibility

Recipients of OVW funds must comply with applicable federal civil rights laws, which, among other things, prohibit discrimination on the basis of disability and national origin. This includes taking reasonable steps to ensure that persons with limited English proficiency (LEP) have meaningful access to recipients' programs and activities and ensuring that these programs and activities are readily accessible to qualified individuals with disabilities, including Deaf or hard of hearing individuals. Applicants must allocate grant funds or other available resources to support activities that help to ensure meaningful and full access to their programs. For example, grant funds can be used to support American Sign Language (ASL) interpreter services, language interpretation and translation services, or the purchase of adaptive equipment.

- 8½ x 11 inch paper
- Number the Project Narrative pages (1-12)
- One inch margins (except for charts/graphs/diagrams, if included)
- No more than 12 pages for the Project Narrative. Additional pages will not be considered by the reviewers.
- Page number limit only applies to the Project Narrative. It does not include the Application Form and other required documentation.

Must be completed in its entirety – **FATAL CRITERIA**

- Original signatures (stamped or electronic signatures are not acceptable).

- SAM Verification - a copy of the agency's current, active SAM registration. To register with SAM, go to <https://www.uscontractorregistration.com>.
- Federal Indirect Cost Rate Agreement (if applicable).
- Agency organizational chart.

Abstract (no point value, limit to 1/2 page, single-spaced)

The proposal abstract, when read separately from the rest of the application, serves as a summary of the proposed project. It should concisely describe the major components of the project.

Project Narrative (0-80 total points possible, maximum 12 pages double-spaced)

Restate and address each numbered/lettered item separately.

1. Site Description (0-15 points possible)

- A. Describe your jurisdiction (for example, college or university police department, city or municipal police department, sheriff's office).
- B. Describe the population and area covered (county, geographic area, and campus areas included). Is your jurisdiction urban, suburban, rural, tribal, campus or a mix of these?
- C. How many sworn officers does your agency have?
- D. List the number of sex crimes reports received in 2017 and the data source.
- E. Which division/unit/squad investigates sex crimes against victims 11 years and older?
- F. How many detectives are dedicated exclusively to investigating sex crimes against victims 11 years and older?

2. Purpose of the Application (0-20 points possible)

- A. Describe in detail the need for this project and any problems or challenges with law enforcement's current response to sexual assault. Include gaps and barriers to providing a trauma informed response in the jurisdiction.

3. What Will Be Done/Tasks (0-35 points possible)

- A. How will funding and participating in this project increase your agency's capacity to thoroughly investigate, in a trauma informed manner, sex crimes against victims 11 and older?
- B. How would funding through this grant increase (and not supplant) the number of personnel investigating sex crimes?
- C. The FCASV site visit, which maps the current response to sexual assault and identifies opportunities for improvement, should take place within the first quarter of the project (by September 30, 2018).
 - a. Propose a timeframe for the site visit.
 - b. List the representatives who will likely participate in the visit from patrol, investigations, leadership/command, the state attorney's office, the forensic exam facility or hospital, and the certified sexual assault program.
- D. The two-day training on trauma informed sexual assault investigations will take place following the site visit and must be completed by the end of the second quarter of the project (by December 31, 2018).
 - a. Propose a timeframe for the two-day training.
 - b. The grantee will host the training. Specify locations available for the training, the size of the room(s), and training equipment available (for example, projector, microphone, computer, screen, tables and chairs – how many learners can fit in the training room and whether there is a room for small group breakout sessions).
 - c. How many agency personnel and from which divisions/units/squads will likely participate in the training?
 - d. Which collaborative partners may be invited to participate in the training (e.g., advocates, nurses, prosecutors, or other responders)?
- E. The project requires regular collaboration with the certified sexual assault program to advance the trauma informed response.
 - a. How does your agency currently collaborate with the certified sexual assault program?
 - b. Describe how your agency will involve the certified sexual assault program in the day-to-day trauma informed response to sexual assault (e.g., ensuring the program is contacted immediately to provide advocacy during medical forensic exams, notifying the program of victims who report outside the timeframe for a medical forensic exam, referring victims for sexual assault services, etc.).
 - c. Describe how the agency will regularly collaborate with the certified sexual assault program (at least quarterly) to advance the trauma informed response and assess the project's effectiveness?
- F. Agencies will revise and update their sex crimes policies and procedures with trauma informed practices.
 - a. Propose a timeframe for updating policies and procedures.
 - b. Describe how your agency will approach this task and who will be involved in the revision and update.

4. Who Will Implement the Project? (0-10 points possible)

- A. List the people who will be involved in planning, supervising, and carrying out all aspects of the project, including collaborating with the certified sexual assault program and what their roles will be.

Budget/Budget Narrative (Attachment B) (0-20 points possible) FATAL CRITERIA

- Agency name
- Line item costs and applicable match amounts
- Source of match
- Budget narrative (to address and justify each line item)

Complete the Budget/Budget Narrative Form (Attachment B) in its entirety. All costs, including match must be identified by line item and explained in the budget narrative to justify how costs directly support the project. Show detailed cost calculations to demonstrate how the applicant arrived at the total amount requested. Include the match source.

XIV. REVIEW PROCESS

Initial Screening

FCASV staff will conduct an initial screening of the application to check for completeness. If any FATAL CRITERIA are not submitted in accordance with stated requirements, the application will be deemed incomplete and disqualified from consideration. Those applicants will be notified that their application has been disqualified.

Review Team

FCASV is committed to ensuring a fair and open application process. FCASV will review all applications submitted under this RFP to ensure fatal criteria requirements have been met. Peer reviewers will then review the qualified applications. FCASV may use internal peer reviewers, external peer reviewers, or a combination, to review the applications. An external peer reviewer is an expert in the subject matter of this RFP who is *not* an employee of an agency applying for the project. An internal reviewer is a current FCASV employee who is well versed or has expertise in the subject matter of this request. The review team will evaluate, score, and rate applications of qualified applicants.

XV. SUCCESSFUL APPLICANTS

Successful applicants will be required to submit additional documentation in accordance with federal/state and FCASV requirements prior to the execution of a subaward. Related information and appropriate forms will be provided by the assigned FCASV contract manager. In addition to the requirements stated above, the STOP OVW Special Conditions are provided in Appendix A of this RFP.

FCASV will have final authority in monitoring, reporting and payment disputes.
